Philosophy Of Christian Education

Immanuel Lutheran School believes that, as a Lutheran School of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, no education is complete unless it satisfies the spiritual, academic, social, and emotional needs of its students and should assist parents in the God-given task of raising their children. Immanuel Lutheran School follows the call of Lord, "Teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." (Matthew 28:20) In doing so, God becomes the focal point of all aspects of education, while providing instruction and guidance in all academic subjects.

This is what our faculty and board of education believes concerning Christian education. We believe:

1. The One True God – The Triune God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, gives us forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation.
2. Baptism is the means of grace by which we become children of God through the power of the Holy Spirit, and receive acceptance into the family of believers.
3. Our call is to carry out God's command, "Go and make disciples of all nations." Matthew 28:19
4. Christian education equips children with a foundation of faith that will be used throughout their lives. "Train up a child in the way he should go and when he is old he will not depart from it." (Proverbs 22:6)
5. In a Christian day school, God's word is studied not only in religious instruction classes, but also integrated into all academic subjects.
6. Christian education involves a life-long study of the Scriptures. All children are encouraged to regularly attend worship services and actively participate in the study of God's word at home, church, and school.
7. Christian education does not only come from the Lutheran day school, but from religious guidance, instruction, and support from school, church, and family.
8. Parents have the primary responsibility for the training of children and the school will assist the parent in the process of Christian education
9. Christian education gives children the spiritual

tools not only to grow in their personal faith, but also to share God's word with others.

Enrollment

Immanuel Lutheran School has an open enrollment policy to afford parents wishing a solid Christian education that opportunity.

To assure a bond of discipleship from home and school, parents and children will agree to the following:

- A. That the children will accept training in the teachings of the Lutheran church as taught from the Bible.
- B. That the conduct of the student will be such as becomes a Christian child and that it be an asset to the spiritual welfare and educational progress of other children.
- C. That the home will support the Christian instruction given.
- D. That members of each family will be faithful and regular in their worship of God and utilize the worship and Bible study opportunities offered by their congregation(s). We also encourage families to pray for other school families.
- E. That the children attend all special church services in which students have been asked to participate
- F. That accurate information regarding the age of the child and previous school training be supplied upon enrollment.

Non-discriminatory Policy

Immanuel Lutheran School admits students of any race, color, national and ethnic origin to all the rights, privileges, programs, and activities generally accorded or made available to students at the school. We do not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national, and ethnic origin in the administration of our educational policies, athletic, and other administered programs.

Board Of Education

Immanuel Lutheran School is under the direct jurisdiction of the board of Christian education, which is elected and is responsible to the voter's assembly of Immanuel Lutheran Church.

The members of this board supervise the training of the children in this school. The board of parish education oversees all the other Christian educational opportunities offered by this church.

They hold regular, monthly, open meetings and keep themselves informed, through various means, of the school's functioning. A regular report is made by them to the voter's assembly of the congregation.

Immanuel has been blessed in having willing, dedicated men to serve in this vital capacity

Curriculum

The word of God is the basis of all instruction. The truths of the Bible are taught not only during the Religion period, but throughout the entire day.

Our aim is to make disciples of all the children of our school, encouraging each to use their God-given abilities to help accomplish this goal. This is the concern of each Christian teacher.

Subjects taught include: Religion, Language Arts (Reading, Spelling, and English), Social Studies, History, Mathematics, Science, Music, Art, Current Events, Health, Environmental Education, Computer, and Physical Education.

Educational Fees

As stewards of our Lord's time, talent, and treasure, we at Immanuel bear a responsibility to the fiscal affairs of operating a school. Our congregation spends around \$2,100 per pupil each school year to provide a great Christian education for children in grades K-8. The cost to educate each preschool child is around \$750/year.

Tuition prices for the 2006-2007 school year for grades K-8 are \$750/child with a cap of \$1,600/family for member of ILS or Redeemer. Non-members tuition fees for grades K-8 are \$850/child with a cap of \$2,000/family.

Preschool families will pay \$45/child/month for 9 months for 2 half days/week or \$60/child/month for 9 months for 3 half days/week.

Registration

Prior to the beginning of school, many loose ends need to be "tied up". Registration is the formal opportunity extended to the parents and students of our school to meet the teachers, fill out the necessary forms, and obtain supply list and other information of the classroom.

There is a registration fee of \$75/child for K-8 graders and a registration fee of \$30/child for preschoolers. These fees will help to pay for Art supplies, Religion books, Computer and Science equipment and supplies, and transportation costs. These fees are payable on registration day.

Preschool

Immanuel maintains two separate preschool programs for the students at a 4 year and 3 year old level. September 1 is the determining date. The preschools are extensions of our day school and are under the jurisdiction of the school board. We believe this is an excellent way to provide Christian and preschool experiences for our children and continue to strive to meet the needs of the families and children who choose to avail themselves of these programs.

Church Attendance

Since religious instruction is an integral part of congregational life, it is extremely important that children attend divine worship services regularly and faithfully.

We encourage you and your family to join us each Sunday for worship and Sunday School. Those families with no church home are encouraged to come and worship.

A children's worship service is held every Wednesday at 8:45 a.m. in the church during the school year (in the 7th & 8th grade room on poor weather days). These services are not intended to replace the Sunday services, but to supplement them. Parents and members of Immanuel are invited to attend whenever possible.

Offering at these services are designated for various mission and charitable purposes.

On the first full day of school a worship service commemorating the opening of school will be held in the church at 8:45 a.m. Parents and all members of Immanuel are invited and urged to attend.

On the last day of school, a worship service commemorating the closing of school will be held in the church. Parents and all members of Immanuel are invited and urged to attend.

Confirmation Instruction

Confirmation instruction is a pastoral and educational ministry of the church which helps the baptized child through word and sacrament to identify more deeply with the Christian community and participate more fully in its mission.

Confirmation instruction is given by the pastor Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday morning each week for students in the seventh and eighth grades. All pupils in these grades are required to take part in confirmation instruction, since it is part of our total educational program.

General School Discipline

The word "discipline" comes from "disciple", meaning "follower". We think of discipline not in terms of punishment, but rather as the teaching of self-control. Those in authority, mainly parents and teachers, are to deal with their charges in accordance with the teachings and philosophy of Christ.

Teachers are to allow such actions which are natural to the developmental level of their classrooms, channel actions where necessary, and finally stop such behavior which interferes with the learning activities of the classroom.

Immanuel Lutheran School is a Christian community composed of students and teachers who acknowledge their creation by God and their salvation through Jesus. Within the framework of this community then, the goal shall be to establish an atmosphere of Christian respect—respect for teachers, students, adults, and property.

If the teacher is unable to obtain the desired behavior of a child, these are the steps to be taken:

1. The teacher is to meet with child and explain how to solve the problem.
2. If this action fails, the teacher and principal will contact the parents, tell them the problem, and ask for their help to straighten this problem out.
3. If the matter is still unresolved after meeting with the child, the parents, and the principal, then the school board will be notified and appropriate actions will be taken to insure that the problem will not continue.

In the classroom, the teacher is solely responsible for discipline.

Guidelines For Children

Children are expected to:

Keep guns, knives and any other instruments that represent violence at home. Parents and Board of Education members will be notified if these kinds of things are brought to school and the child will be immediately suspended.

Obey the rules of no smoking or using alcohol on the school grounds.

Realize that using foul language will NOT be tolerated.

Behave themselves as Christian boys and girls at all times and in all places including church, school, playground, and restrooms.

Refrain from throwing snowballs, shoving, tackling, wrestling, etc. while at school.

Participate in all classroom activities. Non-participation will NOT be tolerated.

Obey all safety rules as they pertain to the playground equipment.

Help keep our building and grounds clean by picking up unsightly trash or litter.

Keep their bikes parked until the end of the school day and leave immediately upon dismissal. Any irresponsible riding and privilege will be lost.

Stay out of the office unless arrangements have been made with the teacher.

Keep audio equipment such as cd players, radios, tape players, t.v.'s, cell phones, etc. are not permitted on the school premises or school sponsored activities unless special arrangements have been made.

Stay on the school grounds and out of the wooded area unless arrangements have been made with the teacher.

Keep dirt (mud) out of the school. Whoever brings the mud in will bring it back out.

Limit the use of the telephone to only emergency situations.

Walk quietly in the hallways.

Refrain from chewing gum!

Take turns serving as our school's safety patrol persons. (7th & 8th Graders)

Bus Policy

Riding the bus is a privilege. Respect of the bus driver is required. All rules need to be followed. If not these are the consequences.

1. 1st offense – bus drivers discretion
2. 2nd offense – student will not be allowed to ride the bus or ride their bikes for 20 school days
3. 3rd offense – discretion of the school board Possible suspension for the rest of the school year.

Reporting And Grading

Immanuel issues reporting evaluations on a quarterly basis. Formal conference between staff and parents are held at the end of the first quarter.

Since formal evaluation can only tell a part of a child's progress, teacher try to maintain an ongoing relationship with the home by way of mid-quarter grades, notes, phone calls, and visits. It is important to

us that you stay informed of your child's progress as often as is comfortable for all concerned.

We invite you to make contact with the school whenever you have questions or concerns regarding your child's school work. Informal conferences are encouraged as needs dictate.

Homework

The challenging program of Immanuel has always required that some study be done at home. This is not only necessary for accomplishing our immediate goals, but also a helpful habit for future education.

The amount of homework depends upon the grade level and the ability of the child.

Although family situations have little bearing on the amount of homework assigned, these situations can cause problems for the child when working to complete assignments. Parents can help by providing encouragement, a quiet place to work, and ample time to complete the assignments.

If a child is unable to complete his/her assignments for any reason, please send an explanation note so that arrangements may be made with the teacher for the work to be made up. If assignments are consistently burdensome, the teacher will appreciate such information so the problem may be taken care of.

Personal Appearance

The school board has determined the following:

Studies have shown that students who are clean, neat, and modest in dress tend to have more self-respect, self-discipline, and do better work than those who are not.

Therefore our emphasis is one of cleanliness, neatness, and reasonableness in appearance and dress.

Clothes which advertise tobacco, alcohol, and music groups that defy Christianity, should not be worn to school as they tend to work against the ideals the faculty tries to instill in each student.

Shorts should be considered a possible choice for students during warm weather. Please make sure that the weather really is warm before you send our child to school in shorts. No cut-offs or short shorts will be allowed.

Students will be able to play outside during cold weather only if the proper attire is worn, including boots, coats, hats, and gloves. Each student must bring a pair of boots to wear when there is snow the ground.

Parents please remember that chapel is held at church and proper clothing is needed for the walk over.

Athletics

Because of our belief in a well-rounded education, Immanuel offers a wide variety of athletics for both boys and girls. We do, however, maintain that athletics hold secondary importance in the making of disciple for Christ.

We encourage all students to take advantage of the extra-curricular activities available. However, if a student is not fulfilling his/her academic requirements or not exhibiting a positive Christian attitude, she/he may be refused participation in those activities. This decision would be made by the teacher(s) and principal and after the child has first been properly informed of possible actions.

Athletic Transportation

All parents are responsible for the transportation of their children to and from games and practices. We usually practice twice a week and have at least one game a week. Please be prompt in picking up your children after their practices and games. Schedules and permission slips will let parents know what times to pick up their children. If you will be unable to pick up your children at the times they need to be, please make other arrangements for them to get home.

Gym Usage

Our gym is a building that all Immanuel can be proud of. It may be used by all members through their respective groups and organizations. In using the gym, members are asked to follow the simple guidelines as adopted by the board of education. A copy of these guidelines is attached to this handbook or available through the school office.

Fundraisers

Prior to Christmas each year, the school participates in a fundraiser project. This money is used to purchase school supplies and equipment, athletic supplies and equipment, and many other educational needs at ILS.

Medication

State law requires certain procedures be adopted by school districts, thus the following procedures will be followed at Immanuel:

1. No teacher will administer any medication without written permission from the parent.
2. All prescription medication to be taken by a

student at school must be accompanied with a doctor's request and parental permission with clear instructions for teacher administration.

3. No child will be allowed to hold or self administer any prescriptions or over-the-counter medication.
4. The teacher is not a professional health care provider. Thus she/he will follow the direction of the doctor and parent and accepts no responsibility for the actions taken by the drug.
5. The teacher will never, in any case, administer medication from a school or personal supply. If a child needs immediate medication, the parent will be notified and the medication brought from home.

School Lunch Program

Immanuel offers a hot lunch program to its students. Meals are offered to all students K-8.

This program is offered in conjunction with the federal government and administered by the state of Minnesota.

Ann Bruns is our cook and is responsible to let us know on Friday what she will serve the following week. This is done by publishing the menu in our weekly school newsletter, the "Braves Express".

The 2005-2006 hot lunch prices are as follows: K-4 cost is \$14.00 for 10 tickets, 5-8 cost is \$20.00 for 10 tickets. A milk ticket for extra milk costs \$2.50 for 10.

After five unpaid meals, food service may be discontinued pending payment.

Further information can be obtained through our school lunch coordinator Sue Erdman.

Activites Calendar

Immanuel publishes a monthly activities calendar which provides the known school activities for that month.

We suggest that this calendar be posted where it can be checked daily, as it includes many important details of what is happening at our school.

Lost And Found

From time to time items belonging to the students and visitors become "lost". Items left for an extended period of time will be placed in a "lost and found" box which you can inquire about at the school office.

To relieve the problem of items left permanently, on June 15th of each year, the contents of the "lost and found" will be sent to a charitable organization.
